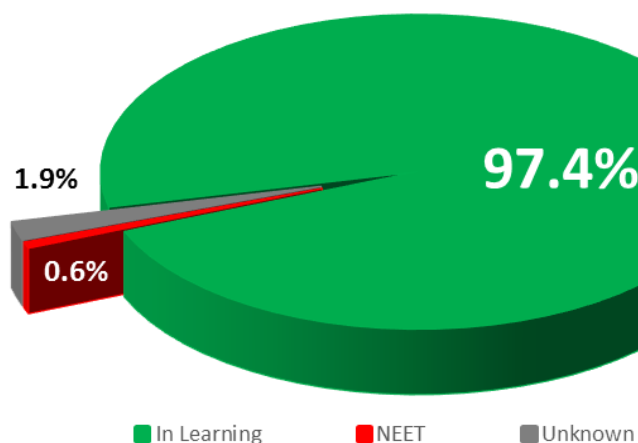


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## 2018 HOLLOWAY SCHOOL LEAVERS – YEAR 11



There were 154 students aged 15 and attending Holloway school in the 2018 Activity Survey cohort.

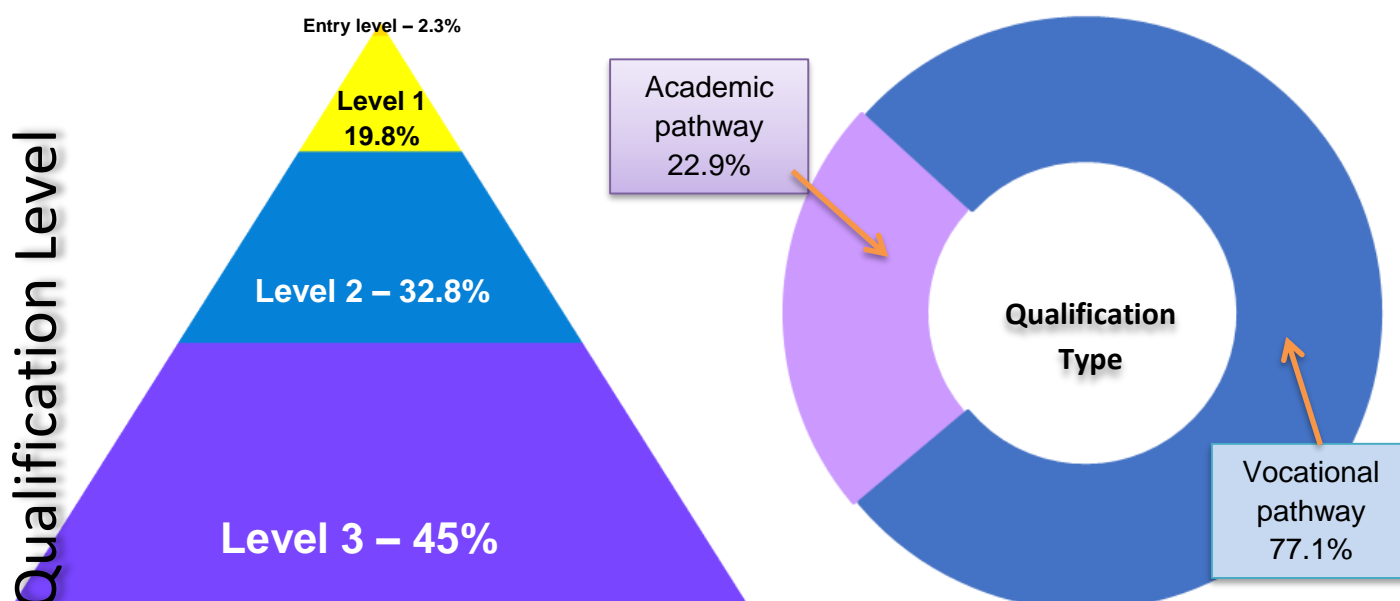
On 1 November 2018, 97.4% of these young people (150) were found to be in an “In Learning” destination. In Learning destination includes post-compulsory education, training, apprenticeships, employment with training or study and re-engagement activities.

One young people, 0.6% of the cohort were not in education, employment or training and the activity of three young people (1.9%) could not be determined.

The detailed destinations table shows most of the young people (114) chose to continue their education in an FE College setting after completing year 11. Another 11 went to other secondary schools and 6 were in sixth form colleges. There were 6 young people on apprenticeship programmes and 4 in traineeships. A further 6 were known to be in training programmes and 2 in re-engagement activities. The young person NEET had an illness preventing them taking up education, employment or training.

A higher percentage of the school leavers in the “Post-compulsory education” destination progressed to do level 3 qualification (45%) compared to other levels. The qualification type breakdown showed 23% of the young people chose to follow academic pathways and 77% chose vocational. Some students might have been studying both academic and vocational qualifications which are counted as vocational pathways.

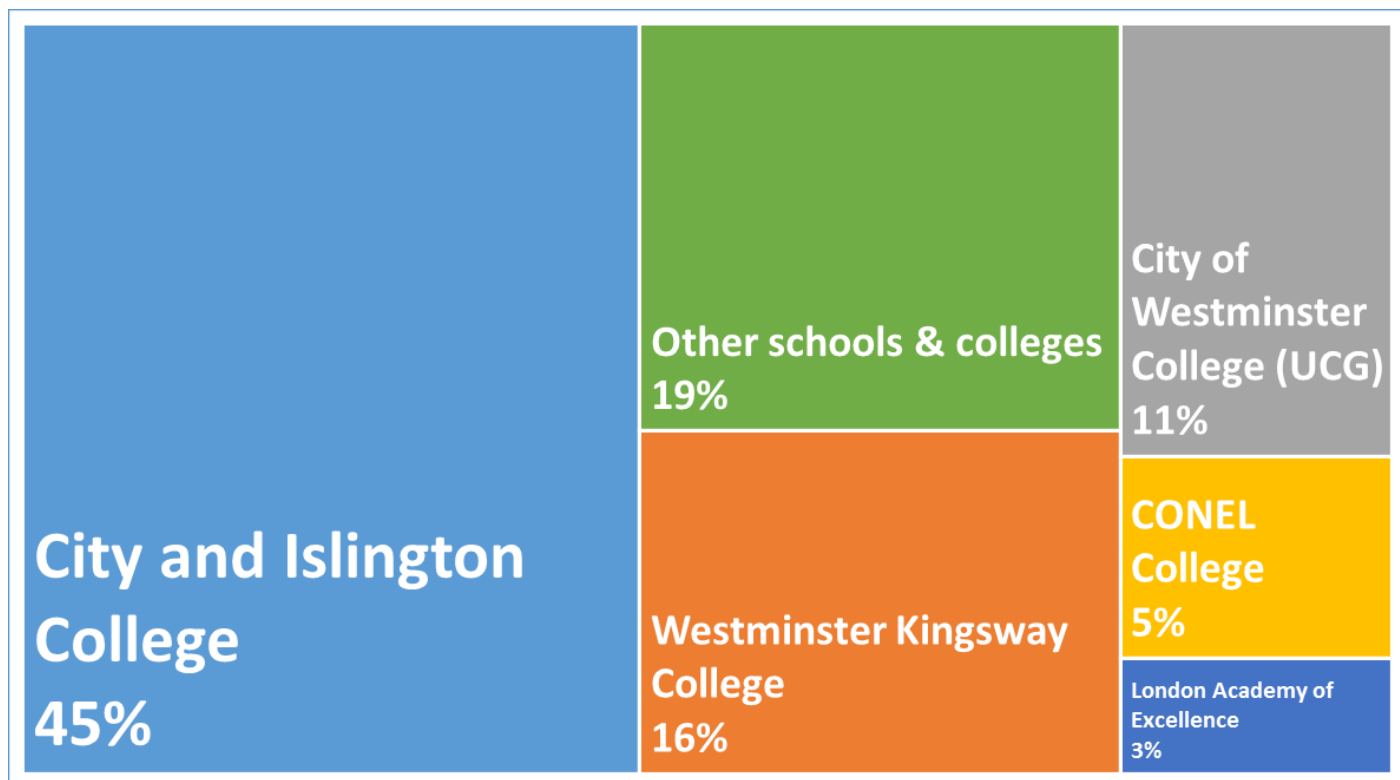


The table below shows the banded Attainment 8 scores and the destination qualification level for those who continued their education in a post-compulsory education destination in each band.

Most year 11 leavers had an Attainment 8 score between 40 and 54.9, which in old grading is equivalent to grades averaging Cs. Majority of these students and almost all of those who were graded higher went on to do level 3 qualifications. Most young people with scores below 40 (averaging D grades or lower) continued their education with level 2, level 1 or entry level qualifications.

The most popular destination provider for Holloway school leavers was City and Islington College, with 45% of young people continuing their education at the FE College. This was followed by Westminster Kingsway College with 16% of Year 11 leavers choosing to attend the FE provider. City of Westminster College also had a noticeable percentage of Holloway school leavers attending the college.



The following table shows the characteristics of year 11 leavers. There were more male pupils than female. While the number of pupils not eligible for free school meals was higher compared to eligible, 70% of the young people were in the pupil premium / disadvantaged category compared to not pupil premium. The cohort had a small number of young people who needed SEN support and five young people with an education, health and care plan. The ethnic breakdown of the cohort showed more White British people, followed by those who identified themselves in the white Other category. Majority of pupils attending Holloway were residing in Islington but there were a number of pupils traveling to Islington to attend the

school from a number of boroughs particularly from Camden. Most students were residing within the 30% most deprived areas, calculated using 2015 “Income deprivation affecting children index (IDACI).”

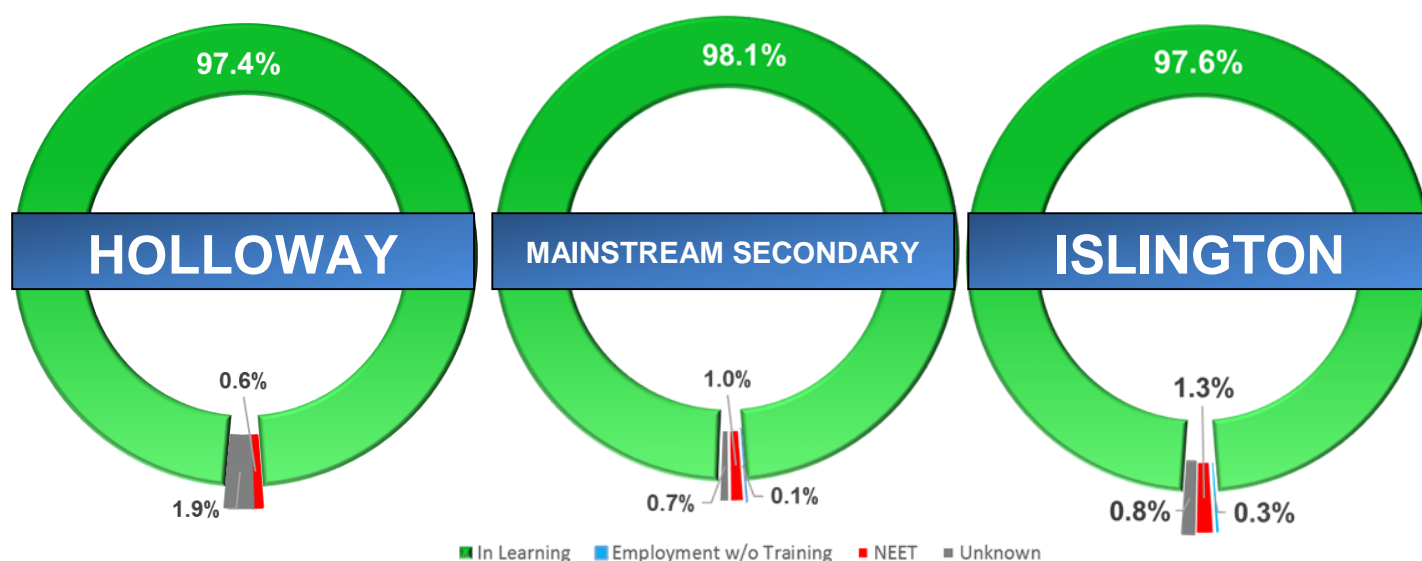
The NEET pupil was a free school meal eligible Turkish male Islington resident with no SEN need. His attainment 8 score was in the lowest band.

## SCHOOL AND ISLINGTON LOCAL AUTHORITY DESTINATION COMPARISONS – YEAR 11

The headline destinations comparisons of year 11 leavers from Holloway school, Islington mainstream secondary school sector and all Islington local authority education providers combined are shown below.

Holloway school had a lower percentage of leavers continuing in an “In Learning” destination compared to the percentage of leavers from Islington mainstream secondary school sector and all Islington education providers, which includes alternative provision and home education, continue in this destination category. The school had a lower NEET percentage with 0.6%, compared with 1% among mainstream secondary schools and 1.3% in all providers overall but a higher unknown activity percentage of 1.9% in comparison to 0.7% in all mainstream secondary and 0.8% among all Islington providers.



The table below displaying the destination qualification levels of those in a post-compulsory education destination, shows a noticeably lower percentage of Holloway leavers doing a level 3 qualification compared to the percentage of leavers at this level from all mainstream secondary schools as well as all Islington local authority education providers.

The percentage of those school leavers doing level 2, level 1 and entry level qualifications compared to the percentages in mainstream secondary sector and Islington education providers on the other hand is much higher.
